#### EDITORIAL

The 1976-77 cricket season for Bentley ended on a spectacular note last Sunday with the club's 7th Grade team losing the final by a solitary wicket. The tremendous fighting spirit shown by JIM WHYTE and his team is to be admired. At times, in both the semi-final and the final, the cause looked lost, but they kept coming back. With this kind of will-to-win, the club can look forward to the 1977-78 season with optimism. In reviewing the past season, one must look to the introduction and the unqualified success of this third team as being the highlight. There was a certain amount of trepidation at the start of the season about the wisdom of introducing a third side, because of the monetary outlay and the possibility of insufficient players to make up a team. However, these worries were dispelled as the season progressed and the side not only covered itself in glory (despite the defeat in the final) but achieved promotion to 6th Grade.

All-in-all, a mighty effort.

Possibly as a direct result of Bentley having an extra team, there has been a lot of new blood introduced into the club --- and this too has been one of the most satisfying features of the season. During the season, there were some 23 new playing members signed on, of whom 14 were with us at the end of the qualifying rounds. Obviously, if the same occurs in'77-78, without the loss of too many of our present players, then the club must grow stronger. Three new players, WAYNE RIEKIE, GREG NAIRN and NOEL HUGHES were regular first-graders, so if we can maintain this sort of average next year, it will put pressures on players who haven't previously really had to perform

consistently.

Where did the three teams finish in their respective grades?
Well, the 7th Grade, as you know, finished 2nd, whilst both the 1st
Grade and the 3rd Grade sides finished 8th. In summing up the
strengths and weaknesses on the playing arena, one must look essentially at the First Grade, because its playing strength has an immediate effect on the composition of the other sides. It is quite apparent that the club is deficient in batsmen as the run tallies over the
season were somewhat meagre. The "A" Grade did not reach 200 once -in fact, none of our sides did. There were only 4 scores of 50 or
over in the top grade for the whole season with 66 being the highest
individual score in this Grade. A top-class batsman, preferably an
opener, should be a major priority for next season. More than one, of
course, would be a bonus. The bowling this season proved to be fairly
consistent with the feature being the relatively even spread of wickets taken ( with the exception of GEOFF FARRALL in the 7th Grade). In
First Grade, this was particulary noticeable. Perhaps their is a
certain sameness in the bowling department with a surplus of good
right-arm medium-paced bowlers. We either need a left-arm quickie or
a bowler of genuine speed -- and speedsters are hard to come by. So,
ears to the ground, everyone. Before leaving discussion on the playing side of the club, I would like to thank on behalf of all playing
members BRIAN HAYWARD and WAYNE on their untiring efforts in the
coaching sphere this season.

The next facet of the club to come under review is finance. We all know how the introduction of Fingo over the last few seasons has given the club a healthy bank balance. Another innovation this season has further boosted our financial coffers. I speak of the gambling nights which brought quick money into the club --and plenty of it,too! A far cry from the days of trying to sell tickets outside the Boomerang Hotel of a Friday night, wouldn't you say? Two new club members are responsible for this money-making scheme and we thank them heartily. I speak of JOHN WATSON and WAYNE. While on the subject of finances, at the start of the season, due to the go-ahead committee, incentive money for top performances was doubled. During the course of the season, 19 different players won incentive money with the total payout being \$435. This scheme was highly successful. I am sure that

the sceptics who consideredthat it might lead to concentration on personal reward, would now be silenced. If a player finds that little extra to capture another wicket or reach 50 runs, then surely it is the club's advantage. In fact, the Management Committee has seen fit to keep the worker going next season with one little ation in the finder the money in late diagram of the wratted from 20 to \$30.

The equipment used over the season was of a higher standard than Certainly the training gear was much improved. past seasons. reason for this, of course, was that, more often than not, the 1st Grade gear was used. A delightful state of affairs for the 3rd and 7th Grade players... but not terribly fair on the 1st Graders. I trust this problem of separate gear for training will be resolved in future. Oh, and here's another talking point about equipment. Perhaps next season, we could look more closely at the prospects of purchasing or making a slips machine. I think the club is professional (and financial) enough to make a positive step in this direction.

It would be remiss of me if I didn't give a final summation concerning Wyong itself. After all, the ground is all-important to the future of our club. The oval itself was at its best condition for It was cut regularly and the pitch surrounds were excellent after the early problems we had in this sphere. However, it is quite evident that we are going to lose players as well as miss out on some top cricketers, unless something is done about the playing surfaces of the pitches. In the initial part of the season, the centre pitch came under criticism for its total lack of pace and the fact that the ball had lost its shine in half a dozen overs. Later in the season, the problem was simply the danger inherent in the pitch. The ball was inclined to rear from a good length on one delivery and then keep low on the next. Anyway, the long and short of it is that the laying of a new centre strip is a major priority for next season.

#### BENTLEY "IN TENSE 7TH GRADE SEMI FINAL

In a game of fluctuating fortunes, Bentley advanced to the Grand Final by defeating Wanneroo Districts by 15 runs on the first innings. Wanneroo batted first and made a very slow start against some tight bowling by "BIJE" MATSON and BILL HARMER. In the 7th over the game the first wicket fell when "BIJE" bowled the manneroo opener. Only 9 runs were scored in the next 40 minutes and when GEOFF FARRALL took. two wickets in one over, wanneroo were in trouble at 3-22. 15 runs later MICK GEUTOS was introduced into the attack and he immediately broke through to put Bentley further on top. However, the next hour belonged to manneroo. A fine stand of 55 saw JIM THYTE desperately changing his bowlers in effort to get a break through. The break came when MICK ran some 30 metres to take a brilliant catch off GEOFF's bowling. Two further wickets then fell with the addition of only loruns. The first went to the tireless GEOFF whilst PETER ROACH bagged the valuable wicket of the manneroo opener who had made an excellent 62. At 7-102 the game was evenly poised but the manneroo tail wagged to take the score along to a respectable 140. GEOFF claimed the remaining 3 wickets to finish with the outstanding figures of 7-44 in a marathon spell of 25.1 overs. Of the other bowlers, PETER was most impressive with 1-13 from 9 overs.

The following day saw KEITH CHAPMAN and BILL give Bentley an excellent start with a parnership of 41. KEITH was eventually dismissed for 15. with the score at 62 BILL was bowled for 39. His was a disciplined inmings of some 110 minutes and he had laid a solid foundation for a substantial Bentley score. Despite the loss of STEVE CAIRNS when the score was 73, Bentley still looked in a sound position. DON GLOVER and "BIUE" took the score along in fine style for the remainder of the morning's session. DON played some beautiful pull shots which scorched across the ground to the boundary whilst "BIUE" was content to play a sheet-anchor role. At lunch, Bentley were in a very comfortable position with the

score at 3-102. Few would have anticipated the drama which was to follow! In the second over after lunch DON was 1.b.w. for 32 (his highest score for the club) and two balls later PETER was given out caught off his pad. Runs were at a premium in the next 40 minutes with "BLUE" and GRAEME TROY defending grimly. Eventually GRAEME was dismissed with the score at 116. Ten minutes later it was 7-120 with MICK back in the after trying to hit his side out of trouble. "BIUE" and JIM pavilion then took Bentley to the brink of victory with a stand of 17. "BIUE" continued to show outstanding concentration and application whilst JIM mixed aggression with defence. The remaining 2 hours proved to be an anti-climax with manneroo making a futile effort to win outright. They made a brisk 1-62 before declaring at ten to five, setting Bentley 15 overs to either survive or go for an outright win. There was no way that Bentley were going to 

### BENTLEY JUST PIPPED IN GRAND FINAL

In the most enthralling game of cricket I have had the pleasure to watch, a valiant Bentley side were beaten by one wicket in the 7th

Grade Grand final. Throughout the match the pendulum swung dramatically from one side to the other right through to the final ball.

Churchlands won the toss and elected to bowl. They met with early success when KEITH CHAPMAN edged the first ball of the second over and was caught behind. BILL HARMER was then joined by STEVE CAIRNS and this pair added 17 before BILL popped a simple catch to silly mid-om. STEVE (a front foot player) obviously found the turf pitch to his liking and he featured in two useful stands, Firstly with DON GLOVER and then with LEN MOULTONbefore he wasdismissed for a well compiled 16. With the score at a mot-too-impressive 5-48, LEN was joined by PETER ROACH and this pair added 25 valuable runs before PETER went in similar fashion to BILL for 12. What followed was little short of a disaster. With LEN anchored at the non-strikers end, the remaining four wickets fell for only 6 runs (all from the bat of MICK GEURDS who was run-out).

Incredibly, Bentley had slumped from a respectable 5-73 to be all out for 79 in the space of just 18 balls. LEN remained not out on 16 (his best score for the year).

Churchlands had to fight every inch of the way to overhaul the meagre Bentley total. Only a fighting innings by their opener who all but carried his bat, and several dropped chances enabled them to score 102 against a steady Bentley attack. JIM "HYTE utilised his bowlers with intelligence and all four were successful. GEOFF FARRALL took 3-28, PETER 2-13, "BLUE" "ATSON" 2-23 and BILL 2-34. Although Churchlands lead was a handy 23, the game was far from over as more than 6½ hours play remained and neither side had displayed the ability to occupy the crease forvany great length of time. forvany great length of time.

Bentley made a disasterous start to their second innings being only 19 runs in front with 5 wickets down. Only KEITH (12) managed to reach double figures. A remarkable transformation then came over the game in the form of DON. In possibly the finest innings played by a Bentley batsman in a final since the Ken Esmond era, DON tore into the bowling with a series of cuts and pulls culminating with a magnificent six over with a series of cuts and pulls culminating with a magnificent six over fine leg. He was aided firstly by a resolute PETER in a stand of 20 and then an aggressive "BLUE" im a stand of 56 in just 34 minutes. The opposition appeared shell-shocked until "BLUE" was run-out for 25. With the exception of GEOFF, DON was unable to find any further allies and he was dismissed for a magnificent 66 (including 9 fours and a six). He had dragged Bentley from the jaws of defeat and with the total of 136 on the board (a lead of 113) Bentley were more than back in the

Unfortunately, Bentley were unable to make the vital early breaks and at 2-68 Churchlands appeared to be coasting to victory. The only successes had been a well executed run out by DON and a solitary wicket to GEOFF. A magnificent diving catch by JIM off GEOFF seemed to lift the side and ten runs later GEOFF struck twice in one over to make it 5-78. Two overs later it was GEOFF again (6-82) and the following over MICK gained a well earned wicket (7-83). Bentley now had their tails up but unfortunately the tea interval intervened and allowed the worried Churchlands players to regain their composure. After tea, runs began to come more easily until FETER was re-introduced to the attack. KEITH took his second catch of the innings and it was 8-97. Four runs later the Chuchlands batsmen showed that the pressure was getting to them.
There was a terrible mis-understanding and KEITH made the simplest of
run outs. (9-101). Then came the remarkable climax to a truly remarkable
game. The Churchlands number eleven came to the crease and, as if batting in a picnic game, swung lustily three times, connected three times and won the game for his side. It was a bitterly disappointed Bentley side. that left the arena, but it was a side that was magnificent in defeat.
Time after time they fought back after being in seemingly hopeless

In all, 51 players represented the Bentley Cricket Club during the season. This figure compares more than favourably with the numbers in past seasons (32 in 73/74, 35 in 74/75 and 35 in 75/76). Of these 51 players, 23 made their debut with the club and a further 2 returned to the Club of the capacity of several seasons. to the club after an absence of several seasons.

No fewer than 12 batsmen scored half centuries during the season and thus availed themselves of the incentive monies offered.

"The only batting record broken in the first two grades was the 4th wicket partnership in the number 2 side when GREG DART and PETER ROACH had a stand of 86.

Although the records set in the number 3 side are inaugural, it is worthy of note that the 106 opening partnership between BILL HARMER and STEVE CAIRNS is the highest opening partnership for Bentley in any grade. BILL's century in the same game is the 12th scored for Bentley. Of the record wicket partnerships set in the number 3 side, 3 were made in the finals.
